



Making toys from old socks is a great way to repurpose and recycle materials.




What materials do we need to make toys from old socks:

- ✓ Decorative materials (e.g. buttons, ribbon, felt)






Spring is more than a simple season, it is a state of mind. Spring comes with joy, with its procession of flowers, light and color. It's time for a new beginning.

We have the opportunity to offer flowers and "mărțișoare (symbol of spring)" to our loved ones.

"Mărţişor" is the name of a romanian tradition celebrated at 1th March and the name of the associated object made from two intertwined red and white strings with hanging tassel.

In today's workshop, we made from recyclable materials "mărțișoare", medallions, ornaments dedicated to March 1st, dedicated to Spring.





Creative wood recycling

Wooden objects can be customized with various painting and decorating techniques and we can transform wooden blanks into a wonderful gift, handmade objects or decorative artistic objects.

Decorating wooden objects is a creative craft activity! Everyone has the freedom to decorate wooden objects through a variety of techniques: painting in acrylic colors, decorative pastes, wood varnishes, pyrography, watercolors, carioci, etc.

A layer of primer or acrylic (liquid paint or acrylic spray) is applied to the absorbent surface of decorative wooden objects before they are painted.

We made medallions from small wooden rounds obtained from tree branches.











Creative recycling of textile threads

From textile threads we can weave, crochet various floral ornaments.

Crocheting is the technique of making textile materials with the help of long metal tools with a bend at the tip called a crochet, with the help of which the threads are crocheted.

The art of crocheting offers the opportunity to use a rich range of yarn chain links and techniques that result in a wide variety of new crochet patterns.

Crocheting is one of the oldest occupations of women in particular, a tradition by the way, which is not only limited to the crocheting of decorative items but also clothing items, especially for children.

Crocheting is one of the most difficult techniques for making clothing items, especially if it is done by hand. From the same thread, with the same crochet, you can make many models, starting from knots, bows, flowers, etc.





Modeling technique

Using plaster or other materials for modeling, by pouring into shapes, interior or exterior decorations for homes can be made.

Bocca della Verita



Bocca della Verita, the mouth of truth, is a marble disc from Ancient Rome with a bas-relief depicting the face of a man. According to the legend, if a liar places his hand inside the mouth on the bas-relief, it closes.

The massive marble disc weighs approximately 1300 kg and most likely depicts the god of the seas, Oceanus. The eyes, nose and mouth are open.

The Roman Colosseum is one of the New Seven Wonders of the World.

The most famous of the Roman fountains: a gem of water and stone

The Trevi Fountain, terminal exhibition of the Virgin's aqueduct, the only one of the ancient aqueducts in continuous operation to this day, is the most famous of the Roman fountains.

Its name derives from a toponym in use in the area since the middle of the 12th century, regio Trivii, referring to the confluence of three streets in the square, or from the triple discharge of the original fountain's water.

the Next to the Piazzi Venezia square there is the remarkable white monument honouring Italy's first king Vittorio Emanuele II. Italians also call the Monument of Victor Emanuel II 'Il Vittoriano' and 'Altara della Patria', or altar of the fatherland. The monument commemorates the unification of Italy in 1861 and the first king of Italy, Victor



Emmanuel II. Although this monument was built in his honour, he is not buried there. Instead, he is buried in the Pantheon.

The twin churches



The Santa Maria dei Mircoli and the Santa Maria in Montesanto are known as the Twin Churches because of its identical exterior structure. However, if one looks closely and compare both churches technically one will see that there are some slight differences.

Leonardo da Vinci Museum

"The Castel Sant'Angelo Rome was originally built as the tomb of Roman Emperor Hadrian in 135 AD. This mausoleum was eventually converted into a military fortress that protected Rome during the Middle Ages. Since then, it has served as the Papal Residence, a prison during the Renaissance era and now, as one of Rome's museums. Other than serving as a repository of historical information, it is a site of immense cultural value that houses many sculptures, architecture, frescoes, and more."

"The Vatican Museums ('I Museu Vaticani') are some of the largest museums in the world with an enormous collection that varies from ancient Roman and Egyptian artefacts, religious objects, beautifully painted rooms and even modern art. The 26 different museums of the Vatican are housed in a complex of multiple Apostolic palaces, and are by far the most popular museum destination in Rome, in part because of the famous Sistine Chapel. During your visit, you will marvel at the many art treasures that the popes have collected in 54 halls since the 16th century."

Vatican Church



"St. Peter's Basilica is one of the holiest temples for Christendom and one of the largest churches in the world. Besides, it's where the Pope presides many liturgies all year round.

The basilica was called St Peter's after one of Jesus's twelve disciples known as Saint Peter, who became one of the founders of the Catholic Church and was executed in Rome and buried where the Basilica now stands."
